Effective waste management and compost making

On the occasion of Environment
Day, Aroha in partnership with HCL
Harit conducted a 3 days studentled campaign on 'Effective waste
management and compost making'
in Nagpur. Students from NMC
schools demonstrated waste
segregation at source and compost
making to beneficiaries and their
children from Udyam livelihood
centre, Wadi and NIWCYD

Community Life Centres at Shanti Nagar, Isasani Nagpur. At the end of three days, nearly 300+ beneficiaries learnt how to segregate waste, make compost and develop and maintain nutrition gardens. Students from deaf and mute school shared their knowledge in waste management and water conservation in sign language.















Yash Kamde, a student of Deaf and Dumb school explained in sign language importance of waste management. He explained how students of his school used leaf litter for mulching in their Nutrition garden. It improved soil fertility and also reduces the water requirement for the garden. He said he has a kitchen garden at his home and uses compost made from green waste in his garden.

We were taught how to make compost from green waste, during Aroha's Environment Education programme at school. I started making compost at home with green waste and my compost was ready within one month. I used it for the plants in my garden. Earlier, we use to throw the green waste in the dust bin, now I am happy that I am making compost out of it.

Case study 1

Bilal hails from a family that has supported him all along despite challenges brought on by his ailment to him and to the family. His father has supported him without a pause to see Bilal live an independent life.

According to his family account. Bilal was born normal with no signs of any serious ailment post birth. However, he might have been four years old when he caught fever one day and the family noticed his inability to stand. They felt something was amiss with Bilal. He was taken to a nearby hospital where doctors after examination diagnosed him with a case of bilateral Post Polio Residual Paralysis (PPRP).

It was a blow to the family, especially to his father who was literally shattered when the doctors told him about Bilal's disability. Despite the hardships, Bilal's father encouraged his family members to support him. "Together, we can help him live a meaningful life. However, I will always regret that fact that I couldn't support him to complete his graduation," says Bilal's father.

Bilal with the support of his family, especially his father, continued school despite numerous challenges posed by the ailment. He was only able to study up to 12th Standard.

Hope intervention



Bilal was identified during an awareness camp by the Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) team of Hope Disability Centre in his native village. His rehab and functional assessment was done right on spot. Being a confirmed case of PPRP, the team decided to focus its treatment on improving his functional impairments and activities of daily living (ADL).

A treatment plan was thus devised by the community facilitator in accordance with his needs. The exercise regimen includes caregiver exercises, passive Range of Motion exercises B/L lower limbs. strengthening exercises for lower, limbs, spine, , upper limbs and ADLs. The CBR team of HDC also provided him a wheelchair to enhance his mobility.

Besides, a low cost home modification was carried out to make his movement easier. He was also provided an orthotic support to prevent his lower limb contractures and deformity.

What is however, heartening is that Bilal is not financially completely dependent on his parents. He runs a kiryana (grocery) shop in his native village and has a meagre income. Before we donated him a wheelchair, he would find it difficult to walk to his shop daily and back. The wheelchair has resolved this problem for him and he can't thank HDC enough.

The family is extremely happy for the support. The intervention boosted Bilal's confidence so much so that he is determined to continue his education and complete his graduation.



Due to lack of availability of services in the area, it was very difficult for me as a father to be a helping hand for my son. But his dedication and hard work always encouraged me to be a part of his journey. I extended every possible help to him to enable him to study further, but due to family pressures and financial deficiency he was able to study only up to 12th standard which I will regret. I always tried my best to reduce his dependency on others to bare minimum. However, I have this consolation that at least he is adding to the family earning.

His grit and resolute determination and support and with the facilitation by Hope Disability Centre - HCL Foundation had him earning an income respectfully.

Case study 2



It is a heart wrenching story of a family that is dealing with not one but four children with special needs. Despite destiny being hard on them, the family refuses to cave in. With poverty further weighing them down as the main provider of the family their father, Muzaffar Hussain is a labourer with meagre income.

Humaira was born with congenital Right Lower Limb deformity- a developmental disorder. The treatment could not be provided at the time of her birth as her father who had to feed and meet the needs of three other children with disabilities was putting a lot of strain on his income.

Consequently, with time the impairment of her right Leg progressively increased necessitating the need for its amputation. Thus she lost her left leg.

Muzaffar had to run from pillar to post to raise money to pay for her surgery and treatment.

"It is not easy under any circumstance to manage four children with special needs with limited financial resources. It could break the back of any person irrespective of his financial strength or otherwise," says Muzaffar.

The poor labourer despite working extra hours would find it extremely difficult to cope with the situation. Often, he had to borrow money from friends and relatives to support his family. The identification of Humaira by Hope Disability Centre was a God sent relief to him.



Due to amputation Humaira could not go to school as she had to walk some distance to get there. But what is heartwarming is that she didn't let her disability permanently dampen her enthusiasm for her education.

Humaira was identified by the community worker of Hope Disability Centre during a routine survey by their CBR (Community Based Rehabilitation) team. After a few counseling sessions her initial assessment was undertaken and a treatment plan was formulated according to the need as part of the intervention plan.

Short and long term goals were set by the team for Humaira to enable her to walk back to school to continue her studies and also help her carry out her activities of daily living by herself. Initial exercise plan would mostly focus on muscle strength. And the long term goal was to improve her functional mobility, restoration of balance and stability and improve her gait analysis. All the exercises were programmed home based.

Physiotherapy considerably improved her condition and gave her a new confidence.
Subsequently, she was provided a prosthetic limb which enhanced her mobility.



Thus, she was able to resume her school which is three kilometers away from her home. Her resilience and indomitable spirit saw her starting a new future and serving as an inspiration to others who are in similar situations. She is currently in 9th standard and is keen to study further.

She will have to continue with the rehabilitation services as facilities of modern medicine like physiotherapy and occupational therapy are non-existent in her village.

Often, I would weep privately for the fate God had willed for me, but at the same time I would draw my strength from the fact that it is divine's own way of testing my strength and faith in him. Honestly, it is extremely difficult to manage four disabled children especially when means of income are limited. The intervention supported my daughter who after physical rehabilitation has been able to continue her studies. It has turned her life around.

Abdul Malik, 45 years old, works as a junk dealer and lives in Lavkush Nagar Assamese Basti, Lucknow. Under the aegis of CHETNA NGO and HCL Foundation, every month a parentsteacher meeting is organized at Lavkush Nagar GURUKUL Point of CHETNA - HCL Foundation which all points related to the education and safety of the children is discussed with the parents. Apart from this, interests of the children are also discussed in the meeting. Motivated by the PTM, a parent (Abdul Malik) decided to work towards a bright future of his children.

Abdul Malik is a parent of 2 children. He prepared all the documents for the education of his children and for their school admission and got them enrolled along with the efforts done by the Educator of CHETNA NGO, which became an example for the children and parents of the Assamese Basti. Where almost all the children of the community worked as Rag pickers,

Abdul is an inspiration and has determined the future of his own children with his work & support, and has also worked tirelessly for the education of Assamese children of Lavkush Nagar Basti.

Mr. Abdul did not send his children to pick garbage instead he sent them to school which was a highly thoughtful decision taken by him for the future of his children. During the process, he faced a lot of problems & many challenges. Not getting Aadhar card of the children was the biggest problem. But he made a lot of efforts and made sure that he got the Aadhar card of his children, so that he could present them & send them to school. He not only succeeded in sending them to school, but also kept on fulfilling every small essential requirement for the education of his children to make sure that the child's education is not compromised in any way. Today, one of his child studies in class 3rd. Looking at his family today, many more parents are getting inspired to send their children to school instead of sending them to work and especially there has been more awareness in the community.

Simultaneously, Mr. Abdul Malik requested the people of the community to build a place for the children to study and also made efforts in arranging lights and fans there. Today many children go and study there to work towards their bright future and fulfilling their dreams because of Mr. Adul.

Improving all aspects of students' health

The foundational elements for good health are water, sanitation, and hygiene. The newly built toilets at Government High School in Huskuru supported by HCL aim to improve all aspects of students' health. The toilets offer the certainty of water supply, gender-segregated restrooms with educational wall art to promote awareness around good hygiene practices. It isn't only limited to the toilet construction, Awareness sessions in the school to raise students' understanding of proper hygiene procedures to keep both themselves and the restrooms clean, organized, and hygienic also follows the toilet construction.





Book keeping training

Aawahan – The New Voice in collaboration with HCL Foundation conducted three days training in which 38 SHG's members participated. The purpose of the training was to strengthen the documentation and build capacities of SHGs. During the training SHG members gained knowledge on Punchsutra and follow up, filling the cash book and individiual pass book, inter loaning process, calculation of interest and retuning back.





Mushroom production and cultivation trainings

Three days training of 10 Self Help Group (SHGs) in Regional Food Research and analysis center was conducted at Lucknow. Mushroom cultivation has been seen as an alternative source of income by these groups. A mushroom grower needs to undergo a practically oriented training program. SHG's member learned the mushroom cultivation and production development through HCL Foundation – Aawahan's support.







HCL Bangalore SEZ campus hosted an exhibition of handcrafted jute, leather products and home-grown NTFPs on June 27, 2022 to observe International MSME Day. Catering to the theme "MSMEs: Road to Sustainable Development" and tagline "MSMEs are the calling of our neighborhood, spine of our economy and spirit of our nation". The exhibition was combined with an awareness campaign to make the corporate employees understand the role MSMEs play in supporting Indian economic growth. #NO ignoring Dirt Again

On this World Environment Day, citizens of Noida participated in various activities to raise awareness and inspire action to safeguard #OnlyOneEarth.


