





#### A journey of hope through the pandemic...#ONEHCL




### Power of One Scholars Shine Bright!

The students either belong to the HCL Support staff or HCL Uday supported communities and schools.

As students around the globe tackle the COVID-19 pandemic to ensure the continuity of their education, 37 meritorious students associated with the My Scholar project, put their best foot forward in the Class 12th Board Examinations. The average recorded score was 73.6% and Antara Kundu and HukumSubedi, My Scholar recipients from Noida, scored 92.8% and 92.6% respectively in the PCM stream. Hukum, also beat all odds and cleared the HCL TechBee entrance and is now training under the program, based on his merit-based admission."

#### **Power of One Hero**

Mr. Vijay Anand, based out of Chennai, is a Power of One Champion and regularly engaged in the volunteering activities of HCL Foundation. More than 250 students benefitted from videos posted on fitness & health tips, moral stories and art & craft, by Mr. Anand. ## HCL Foundation Celebrates National Nutrition Month (Poshan Maa)

Contributing to the MAA (Mothers' Absolute Affection) programme of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, with an aim to improve breastfeeding and complimentary feeding practices among lactating mothers to achieve higher breastfeeding rates, HCL Foundation in partnership with Breastfeeding Promotion Network of India, conducted a 4-day training course for AAAs (Anganwadi, ASHA, ANM) on Infant and Young Child Feeding Counselling. Observing social distancing protocols, the first batch of training for 20 AWWS and 2 AWW supervisors was held in Gautam Budh Nagar with support from DPO, ICDS Programme of Ministry of Women Child & Development.

Each participant received a AAA field utility kit (Bottle, Umbrella, 2 Masks, Gloves, Sanitizers, Cap, ORS) along with manuals, guides, dummy breast & baby model for field-based demonstration. A total of 240 frontline workers in 8 batches will be trained by December 2020 to provide skilled counselling support to pregnant & lactating mothers.



# HCL Foundation in partnership with Delhi Govt. inaugurates a child-friendly isolation & treatment ward at LNP



HCL Foundation, in partnership with the Govt. of Delhi and Doctors for You, officially inaugurated the COVID-19 care facilities, including child-friendly isolation and treatment wards, at the Lok Nayak Jai Prakash Narayan (LNJP) Hospital in Delhi. HCLF support include a 100-bed Isolation and Treatment unit at the hospital, an ambulance with Advanced Life Support and Ventilator, infrastructural and human resource support for 120+ nursing, paramedical & medical staff, while DFY will train and build capacities of healthcare professionals on COVID-19 management at the hospital.

## COVID Warriors Nurses Training in Nagpur by HCL Foundation

HCL Foundation and NIWCYD under the project Earning with Dignity is focusing on Marginalized youth in urban slums since 2018.

Over the last three years, more than 350 youth were trained in- General Duty Assistants (GDA)/Assistant Nurses, Retail and Agro processing. Around 100 young women underwent 10 months training in General Duty Assistant (GDA)/ Assistant nurse and were certified from Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University (YCMOU) in two batches. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic and upon the request of Additional Municipal Commissioner, Nagpur Municipal Corporation, 25 Assistant nurses volunteered to be deployed at 8 different Quarantine Centers across the city. Thus, strengthening the existing machinery. These Assistant Nurses are currently deployed to conduct routine tests. They also provide psycho-social support and training on maintaining personal hygiene to all those quarantined at these centers.





### SHG Women Members Show The Way!

Trained by the NGO Awahaan, the women of the local self-help group stitch school uniforms, augmenting their family income. With the center in lockdown and the women self-isolating, income sources were drying up. With both livelihood and health in peril, they decided to stitch masks to providesafety from the virus and security of income. Sheetal – the center manager took it upon herself to coordinate 'work from home' for the SHG members and ensured flawless working of the supply chain.



KhadiGramodyog
Sansthan stepped in to
provide quality cotton
free of charge and
offered to buy the
stitched masks. Buoyed
by this partnership, these
spirited women have
produced 4,000+ masks,
adding INR 10,000
valuable rupees to the
family income.

In Nagpur, Jaya Hastak, facing extreme financial difficulties, heard about the mask making initiative at the AROHA run training center and immediately signed up. Rising above her personal fears and determined to beat the virus, Jaya joined eight more women who have collectively stitched 3,000 masks.

Both Jaya and Sheetal represent the gutsy women who are members of SHGs supported by the HCL Foundation.









#### **Stories of Transformation**

### **She Hope Society For Women Entrepreneurs Health Category, Recipient HCL Grant 2019**

On this particular day i.e. on 17th August 2020, the team (Field team – She Hope Society)early morning started its journey for Kupwara-a border district- for the camp. This is also a conflict hit border area. The visit is arranged by logistic manager keeping track of the event including travelling of technical team.

As the team was on its way to Kupwara, just when it was three kms away from Baramulla which is 55 kms away from Srinagar, an encounter between militants and security forces broke out which reportedly left three security forces personnel dead. Right away logistic manager got in touch with the team and suggested a different route to evade the incident spot. Consequently, they got past the incident scene and safely reached Kupwara where they held the camp as scheduled.

Upon their return the team had to negotiate another violent encounter between security forces and militants which resulted in the death of two militants. The team was again guided by our logistic team and managed to reach office safe. Although, it was a nerve-wracking experience for the team, they, nevertheless, completed the task.



#### Under The Mango Tree Environment Category, Recipient HCL Grant 2020

With the announcement of complete lockdown in the month of March due to the outbreak of COVID-19 pandemic, field mobility was halted. UTMTS re-engineered its operations in the field to take into account the current circumstances. The face-to-face team meetings planning were replaced by virtual meetings to carry forward the work and local resources were mobilized. 21 potential villages for project implementation were identified in Dahanu block, Palghar district through virtual meeting with local team, of which 15 were visited later. The fear of the unknown amongst the people in the new area was contained with familiar local people visiting the villages.



#### Sightsavers India Education Category, Recipient HCL Grant 2018

Vishal, is a boy with total blindness, coming from a remote village of Jehanabad in Bihar. Belonging to a deprived background, his father is engaged in farming. Vishal is the youngest in his family and has always experienced struggle in his life.



Last year, Sightsavers' project staff met Vishal and was then encouraged to get enrolled under the Inclusive Education Project, supporting him with necessary tools and trainings. Under HCL project, a mobile phone loaded with textbooks in Epub format (Electronic publication accessible books) was given to Vishal for his learning. Regular training sessions on using the phone for learning purpose were arranged.

Vishal was often contacted by Sightsavers team to check up on his well-being and progress in his studies. He was also counselled and motivated for completing his secondary examination which ultimately led to good scores. He is now being supported under Sightsavers' Tele Mode of Education approach to complete the curriculum syllabus.

When the results of 2019-2020 academic session were announced, Vishal was overjoyed to hear that he scored first division in his secondary board examinations. At Present, he is determined to complete his graduation and wishes to work as a Banker in future.

#### **Voice of COVID Warriors**



Rajesh (Farmer, Patti Village)

"I'm a farmer from a small village in Hardoi, UP. During COVID-19 lockdown, one of the many problems we farmers faced was the lack of transportation. March is an important month for the harvest of vegetables in our area and because of their perishable nature, it was not possible to store it at the village level even for 1-2 days. But even after getting the good harvest, we had no means to reach the market. Police and authorities had sealed the roads and our safety. We were scared as nothing was clear. I knew I had to do something then because earning money was important for not just me but all the farmers.

I became aware of the rules, regulations and procedures to carry out essential activities during the lockdown and got a pass for 2 vehices issued from the mandis in Lucknow and Hardoi. Every day, I used to make two rounds to to ensure that most of the farmers are benefitting from it. We even managed to sell around 30 tonnes of tomatoes to traders in Kathmandu. I knew that with every round I was making to the mandi, I was putting myself at risk but what sort of a person I would be if I didn't help people around me. They needed money to run their house. I'm happy I could help farmers from 5 villages. We will pull through these difficult times together!"



Virendra Bajpayi (President, Village Water and Sanitation Committee,

Purwa Village)

"There is an overhead tank on my property which ensures potable water supply to 180 households. When the government announced the lockdown, water demand was already at a high due to summer and the arrival of migrant workers in the villages only increased it further. I got worried about the village hygiene situation which also demanded active participation. I have always believed that ensuring safe sanitation practices and access to safe drinking water, minimises the health hazards, and it will surely help reduce the ill effects of COVID pandemic.

Therefore, I never stopped in my duty. I've been making water supply available three times a day. During the lockdown, I also managed to convince 20 new families to get a water connection and ensure safety during this pandemic. I'm still trying to convince all the people around me to get safe drinking water supply. I take all safety measure when I collect the contribution amount from households or to speak to new families. All I want back are the days where everybody can talk to each other again without any hesitation but also have a safe drinking water supply at their homes!"

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Ramswaroop (Gram Pradhan, Gogawanjot, Bahendar)

"As a Gram Pradhan, it is my responsibility and duty to take the necessary steps to ensure the safety of my people. I realised it is crucial to make people understandthe crisis

We started utilising rickshaws for public announcement. They moved from one village to another, circulating information on COVID. The next step was to make sure that all the villages are sanitised, and people coming from other places were kept in quarantine with strict instructions of no contact.

The third step was to ensure the sanitisation of the most crowded places such as ration shops where we kept sanitizer, soap and water. We also make sure that people do not assemble in one place.

At regular intervals, I checked the condition of health and safety facilities in the gram panchayats. I know it's risky, but I also know that my people are my responsibility. Just by making rules and regulations, things won't work. They will work with effective management and care. I keep myself updated and try my level best to save people of my GP from this pandemic."

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Mr Vipin Kumar (Driver -Mobile Health Clinic)

"It's hard to head out and work when the whole world is trying to save their lives and their loved ones from a threat that we can't see or predict. In the first few days of lockdown, no one had a clue as to why we were advised to stay inside, what is happening! I work as a driver for the Mobile Health Clinic. So, naturally I had to go to work when everyone was told to stay at home. The Mobile Health vans that we drive are being used by the health department of the district to test for COVID-19 patients. During my duty, I have to wear PPE suit continuously for 5-6 hours till the samples are taken. It becomes hard to move in these PPE suits. On the days when it's very hot it becomes all the more tiring and stressful to be in these suits. But we try and support as much as possible. We also help in giving instructions and managing the crowds so that they adhere to social distancing and in return help all the community members.

When I started working during the lockdown, I was scared as I did not know what I'm up against and what the disease does! But I still go out carrying courage and positivity with me because, even while risking my own life, I'm able to help others. I hope that the disease ends soon and we can go back to our normal lives."



Madhu (Artisan, Kachhauna)

"I'm an artisan and the leader of handicraft CIG (Common Interest Group) of Taat Embroidery in a village of Kachuana Block, Hardoi, Uttar Pradesh. During the lockdown, all our orders got Cancelled and I was sad about the condition of women who used to work with me. I then managed to encourage nearly 25 women and trained them to make face masks while simultaneously monitoring the quality, maintaining production record and keeping regular checks on the availability of raw material. Our group made 40,000 masks in the first 45 days and have managed to earn Rs. 4700 each at a time when there was hardly any income. Today, it gives me immense pleasure that I could help them train and earn in such hard times. I wish to donate the face covers to people who cannot afford to buy them. This way, I will be able to help people fight this pandemic."

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#### Clean Noida

#### Clean Noida Green Champions 2020

The Clean Noida Green Champions
Programme was a 4-weeks experiential
learning program where 120 participants
gained knowledge, with an aim of making them
aware of and understand Solid Waste
Management (SWM) process, adapt
sustainable and best SWM practices and also
how to manage waste at home during COVID19 through online webinars and engagement
activities at home.

HCL Foundation through this programme disseminated an opportunity to better understand Solid Waste Management (SWM) both, at household and community levels, to look at waste management through the lenses of Gender and Resource parameters, how the regular SWM has been impacted by COIVD-19, etc., and all these thematic areas with the help of waste management experts.

#### Highlights of the Event:

- 8 webinars with SWM experts covering different topics of SWM covering the above thematic areas.
- 4 Waste-pe-Charchha session to discuss the issues and solutions pertaining on SWM and stakeholder responsibilities.

All the participants were given digital certificates, sustainable goodies box and E-vouchers after successfully completing the 1-month internship program.




Figure 3 Resource Mapping of the neighbourhood by a Green Champion

### E-garbage loaders in sector 30, Noida

Realising the need and requirement to make people understand regarding Solid Waste Management (SWM), Clean Noida initiated work in sector 30, where segregation was the major problem and the workforce was not trained on the aspects of SWM. To address this problem, multiple initiatives were taken in the sector like awareness generation through Nukkad Nataks, Interpersonal Communication and wall paintings; training and capacity building of sanitation workforce, residents, domestic helps, school students and distribution of personal Protection Equipment(PPE) to sanitation workforce.

After certain period of time, bio methanation plant was installed in sector 30, the first sector in Noida to do so. By the installation of machine, the importance of segregation came into consideration in a much better way. To fulfil the gap, HCL Foundation donated three compartmentalised E-garbage loaders in the sector, for collection of waste into three different categories i.e. Wet, Dry and Hazardous waste. The utilisation of E-loader was smooth in the sector and residents started segregating the waste, since with the introduction of E-garbage loader the whole system was established from collection of segregated waste to composting. It also helped to fulfil the demand of composting machine installed in the sector. With E-garbage loaders in place, wet waste collection increased previously from 250kg to 650kg per day.

Established and inaugurated **Integrated Control & Command Centre** for Noida Authority to help monitor and manage performance of 395 vehicles, 3,807 employees, 9 sweeping machines, real-time complaint management, etc.
